Construction to begin on new home

If you'd like to be an investor in the community of Frederick, here's your chance. The Frederick Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) is listening to the results of an informal housing study completed by a committee from Rise Up & Raise the Bar that says family housing is needed in Frederick. If everything comes together, a new four-bedroom, three-bath home with a two-stall garage could be ready to move into as early as September.

The FEDC is looking for \$50,000 in investments in increments of \$2,000 to establish a down payment for this and potential future housing projects.

The FEDC will work with Homes Are Possible Inc. in Aberdeen on this project. The expected sale price of the home, to be located on an empty lot northeast of St. Paul's Church, will be \$190,000. A similar home in Aberdeen would sell for more than \$225,000.

The investments will be tied up for a maximum of nine years with interest payouts every three years. This idea is based on a successful similar project in Herreid, S.D. The 2019 Day of Champions turned out to be a truly great event as forecasted snow and rain did not arrive.



Plan now to avoid 'learning loss'

It is hard to believe that another school year has come and gone already! I want to start by congratulating the graduating class of 2019. High school comes with many challenges, and the earning of this diploma should not be taken lightly. Be proud of your many accomplishments! I hope that you all will reflect fondly on the memories gained here at the Frederick Area School and return to be supporters of future graduates.

Speaking of diplomas and the skills needed to earn them, I want to remind our readers about the dangers of summer learning loss. The statistics are alarming. Although summer is a much needed break from the routine and structure of school. on average students lose a whole month's worth of learning over the summer. This adds up quickly. Students who suffer from summer learning loss can unfortunately, by 6th grade, fall up to two years behind their classmates! This month of loss takes about six weeks of recovery time when students return to school in the fall, so instead of learning new material, time is spent getting students "back up to speed."

So what can you as parents, families, or caregivers do to prevent summer learning loss?

First, read ... read! Visit your local library, allow children to check out books of their own interests, and find creative ways




to make reading fun. Try having children read in the morning, before the craziness of the day takes over. Even 10 minutes a day will have a huge impact!

To make reading more fun, take a book to the beach or park to read, or have students make videos of themselves reading a book to share with you (or grandparents!) later, or read while you eat breakfast, or read the billboards aloud as you travel. The important thing here is to make sure that students continue to read regularly over the course of the summer.

Math skills are important too! Doing things like counting the coins in your pocket every night, telling you the time on an analog clock and determining what time that fun summer movie will be over, or adding up the amount of money you will be spending to get your family in at the pool are ways to practice learning without students even knowing it.





TRACK

Track meets are few, thanks to weather

Weather has created a very limited track schedule this spring for Frederick athletes, with 14 meets canceled. As of the beginning of May, the track team had attended only four meets.


Coach Marty Morlock said he told the kids that they need whatever they could to maintain their productivity. "If we have a good day to compete or train, we need to make sure we are putting forth the effort that makes us better—running hard in practice, preparing for the meets we get to go to, weather permitting," he said.

Twenty-eight students are out for track, but only 11 of them are high school students. There are two seniors, one junior, three sophomores, five freshmen, five eighthgraders, 10 seventh-graders, and two sixthgraders.

The goal for the younger athletes is in large part trying different events to see where they might find success. "I have been impressed with most of the students' effort and flexibility in trying new events and competing," Morlock said.

The bar is higher for high school athletes, though they aren't likely to come home with team honors very often because there are so few of them. "I plan on the Frederick Titans playing a spoiler role," Morlock said. Doing better than they have at the previous meet is also a goal at each meet. "If we can get new PRs (personal records), I view it as a success," he said.


The high school athletes set their sights making it to the state track meet. They could qualify for state in two ways: either achieving the standards set for each event set by the SDHSAA, or by being one of the top two finishers at the region meet on May 16. The goal for the junior high athletes is to come home with a medal from regions. "Not every kid is going to achieve their goal, but that is fine," Morlock said. "As long as they compete with a purpose, and do their best, that is the goal that matters."



A history of excellence on display



Frederick Area students will have a sense of the great athletes who came before them, thanks to a gift from the family of the late Delores Anderson. A board displaying the track and field records of Frederick students is being installed in the gym. The oldest record is held by Ed Schense (a younger sibling of the Schense guints, who received fame by being one of the first sets of quintuplets), who ran the 100-meter dash in 10.90 seconds in 1956. Alex Sumption has the most recent records on the board, with 22.46 seconds in the 200-meter dash, 6'6" in the high jump and 21' 8 1/4" in the long jump. Take some time to go through the list to find other local residents who have held onto records for decades!
