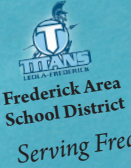

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Kosters to fill Schlosser's spot on board

St. Paul's Lutheran Church hosted two well-attended funerals recently: On Oct. 12, the community gathered to remember Gary Schlosser, who died unexpectedly Oct. 6 at the age of 61. The service for Bruce Durham, who died Oct. 29 at the age of 68 after an 11-month battle with pancreatic cancer, was Nov. 2. The loss of these men will leave noticeable holes in the fabric of the community.

Schlosser's death also left a leadership role to be filled: He had begun a three-year term on the Frederick Town Board this spring. The board decided during its October meeting to ask Frederick Area School District Superintendent Jeff Kosters to fill that seat through May 2020.

Kosters said he has accepted the appointment. Kosters has 20 years of city government experience. He was mayor of Selby for 14 years, a term that just ended in May. Before that, he had served as board chairman in Hayti when he was teaching and coaching in Hamlin.

Since the monthly town board meeting currently conflicts with the school board meeting, the town's meeting date will change to the second Wednesday of the month. The appointment was to be made official at the board's Nov. 6 meeting (this month it's the first Wednesday due to conflicts).

The seat would be open for anyone eligible to petition to be a candidate for the last two years of Schlosser's term. That means two seats will be open in 2020; typically one seat is open each year.

Why did the moose cross the road?

Probably looking for love and adventure, it turns out. This moose was spotted northeast of Frederick, shown here crossing Brown County 14 just north of Brown County 5, on Oct. 24. Brown County Conservation Officer Nick Cochran said young bull moose do show up here occasionally. Most recently before this sighting, two bull moose were spotted near Wylie Park in July. A population of moose live in northern North Dakota (enough that there is a resident-only hunting season for them), and when mating season starts in the fall, the bigger bulls will often run the younger bulls out of the area. They wander around looking for moose cows and new territory, and often then go back to the herd after a time if they don't find a mate. This bull does have a small chance at being lucky in love: Cochran said Oct. 25 that three moose cows had also been seen in Brown County.

Testing is one piece of the picture of student achievement

I would like to take this opportunity to dive a little deeper into the Frederick Area School's report card and data. Governor Noem's disappointment in our state test scores has been a hot topic amongst local educators. This may have sparked the question for you, how is my school doing? Many of you may have caught the snapshot FASD's district data presented in last month's issue of the FYI. The district data is only a piece of the picture. In analyzing the data, it is important to look at the smaller schools within the district so that one can understand the full picture of strengths and weaknesses in the district.

Data collected includes a school's state testing data, attendance records, ACT and NCRC test scores, and more to analyze schools in order to produce each school's report card. Different school levels have different data collection points. For example, the elementary and junior high are scored on South Dakota State Assessments, student progress on the South Dakota State Assessments, and attendance. High schools are scored on South Dakota State Assessments, College and Career Readiness (ACT and NCRC scores), and 4-year high school completion rates. When looking at overall ratings for the school, it is not really fair to compare the junior high and elementary to the high school as the overall scores are obtained by different measures. Just



understand that all of these pieces paint an overall picture of how the district is serving its students.

In looking at our elementary school, our overall score was a 70%. The elementary data brings both good and bad news. The good news is that yes, compared to state average we met or are above the state's average. In English Language Arts (ELA), the elementary scored at 54% proficient or above. This is the same as the state average. In Math, 59% of our elementary students were proficient compared to 46% at the state level. Science took a hit at the elementary level this year, with only 17% of our elementary students achieving proficiency in science. Sadly, all of these scores in the elementary are down from a year ago. Science saw the biggest drop, having an 80% proficiency rating a year ago. The other subjects fell about 10%, which with our small school numbers can be the difference of one or two students.

The junior high had an overall score of 65%. The great news in the junior high is that all scores are on the rise, being both above

the state level and having more proficient students than we did a year ago. In ELA the junior high was 80% proficient. This is significantly above the state level of 54% and beating our own score of 65% last year. Mathematics went up from 44% to 63% proficient this year, again well above the 46% the state saw. Science also saw a climb from 50% to 67% proficient, again scoring us well above the state level of 40%. All three content areas climbed nicely. One reason for the lower overall score when compared to the elementary is student attendance. The elementary had 97% of students meeting attendance guidelines while the junior high saw 93%.

Our high school also did a great job this last year. The overall score for the high school was an amazing 95%! The proficiency percentages did fall slightly from a year ago, but as I said before, for us this can be the difference of just one or two students. We were 75% proficient in ELA, 67% in math, and 58% in science. These are all well above the 54%, 46%, and 40% at the state respectively. We are also showing above state average ACT scores, an average of 24 compared to the state's 22. We can also proudly say that we have a 100% graduation rate and that 83% of our students show they are ready for college or to enter the workforce. This is what the end goal is after all, so we should be proud that our school and community work so hard to make sure that this remains true.

There are some things to con-

sider when looking at this data. First, we are a small school with a small data pool. It only takes a few students to skew our data one way or the other. Second, science testing is tough. Students in grades 5, 8, and 11 are the only ones tested for science, and these tests require that students remember material that they may have learned three years prior. Third, most of the data in the report card comes from one test score. This is a snapshot of time and shouldn't be the only measure we use to determine our district's success. At the end of the day, it is just a number. It cannot indicate our students' wellness, safety, daily knowledge gained, relationships formed, or many of the other qualities of a great school.

So what does this mean for us? We will continue to push academics and provide a full quality education to all students. We have looked at the data and are making changes in curriculum and staff development to make us stronger teachers which in turn will build stronger students.

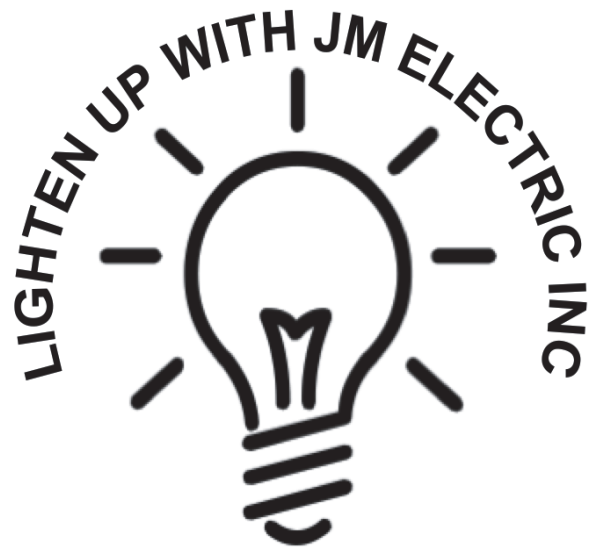

The Leola-Frederick junior high volleyball had a full roster of 19 girls this fall: seven sixth-graders, six seventh-graders, and six eighth-graders.

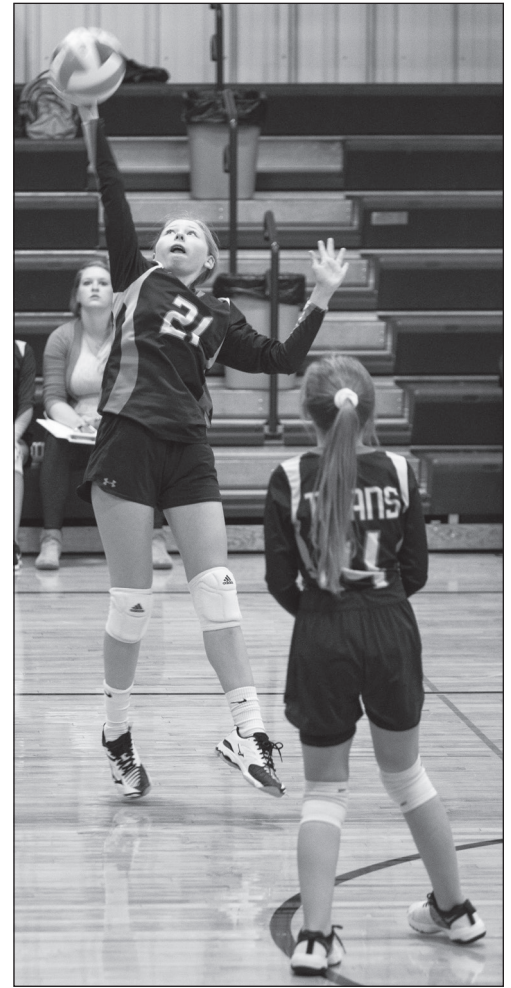

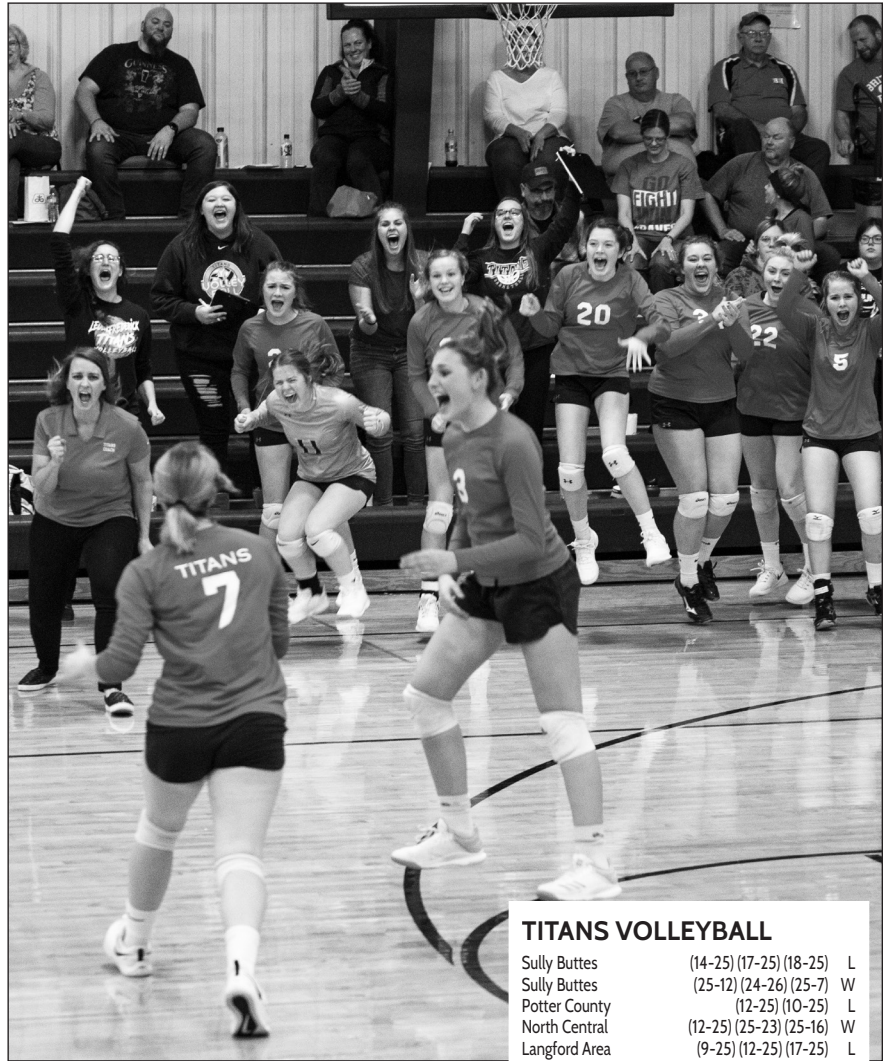
