The third quarter has come and gone and we are in the final quarter of the 2017-18 school year. The winter sports seasons have both come to an end. The number works 24 hours a day, seven days per week, and the calls are funneled to the Helpline Center in Sioux Falls. 

past year provided This many opportunities to fulfill FAHS's mission during Frederick's Annual Finn Fest and Frederick High School's 5-year all class reunion. The Fylppa Building, which houses the local museum and FAHS gathering place, was filled with much laughter and stories as former classmates and friends reminisced about their days | growing up in Frederick and going to school.

There is no greater witness to the success of our organization's mission than to have visitors and former area residents share words of thanks, gratitude, and appreciation.

Many stories and memories were shared | over the weekend. There is a couple in particular that are worth sharing, which validates our mission.

Rick Smith, who grew up in Frederick with his family, shared a story of interest. Rick used to help his dad, Alan Smith, who

was the owner and editor of the Brown County News. The weekly paper was a must read publication for those who lived in the Frederick area. While flipping through some of the past editions of the newspaper, Rick stumbled upon a 75-year commemorative edition of the local Brown County news. He asked if he could get a copy of that edition because it provided many memories of his time in Frederick and working with the family newspaper. We happened to have an extra copy of that edition which we gave to Rick. In return he shared an unsolicited gift of money to our mission.

Former residents of Frederick, Art Borden and his sister Vickie, donated two tanned horsehide blankets and a pair of gloves. These keepsakes were given to the Borden family by their grandfather, Allen Morgan, who was also a former resident of Frederick and worked for Standard Oil. What made these items so special was that the horsehide blankets and gloves were made from the hides of his favorite horses. The horses were used by the Morgan family, which pulled their horse drawn buggy for leisurely rides. Being he was so fond of his horses he wanted to remember them after they were gone by having their hides made into blankets as well as a pair of lined horse hide mittens.

Another meaningful gift recently donated was a thick blanket. Iennie Heis worked on the farm with her husband Henry and also assisted local physician, Dr. Bruner, in making house calls to neighbors to address health care needs during horse and buggy days. The blanket was used to her keep warm during those cold winter rides. Mrs. Heis was the grandmother of former local resident Tom Heis.

These are a few of many stories and gifts that were shared by former residents who are thankful for the opportunity to have a place to reflect on past experiences and share personal pieces of family history.

While we continue to make internal and external improvements to the FAHS building and property, the real significance of our mission comes from creating opportunities for people to share memories and share meaningful treasures with those who have an interest in the history of Frederick and their heritage.


