Local foundation meets challenge

The North Brown Community Foundation has received a \$37,500 matching grant from the South Dakota Community Foundation (SDCF). The foundation advisory council and its stakeholders were recently successful in completing their challenge of raising \$150,000. Because of many donors and SDCF's matching grant, over \$240,000 is permanently held at SDCF for the benefit of charitable causes in northern Brown County.

Noting that the foundation will soon be able to make grants totaling more than \$10,000 per year, foundation president Heidi Marttila-Losure said, "This is a milestone I thought it would take us many

Isaac Sumption scores his 1,000th career point Feb. 4





years to reach. I'm impressed and touched by the generosity and love of community that got us to this point so quickly." She especially mentioned the very generous gifts of former Frederick area resident Bertha Turnquist in helping meet the goal.

The North Brown Community Foundation accepted the challenge in 2018. The fund is a permanent endowment with SDCF and managed by a local advisory council.

"We are proud to partner with the North Brown Community Foundation to create a sustainable funding source for nonprofit organizations in the area," said Patrick Gallagher, Aberdeen-based Community Development Coordinator for SDCF. "This fund will provide a vehicle for current, past, and future residents to give back."

Donations to the North Brown Community Foundation are invested along with other SDCF endowed funds. A percentage of the fund's value is made available annually for the local advisory council to distribute to charitable and nonprofit causes in the area. As the fund grows, so will the annual amount available to give back to nonprofit groups and organi-



zations making a difference in northern Brown County.

Giving \$10,000 per year will happen as soon as the funds 48-month rolling average goes over \$225,000, a point that may take a few years to get to.

Last year, the fund had about \$2,500 to donate, and this year, it can give about \$3,600. The board will announce its 2021 grant recipients during its annual meeting on March 9. The board decided in February not to have a public event this spring, but they hope to have an event honoring donors this fall.

Homeschool bill has accountability, fairness concerns

The third quarter will come to an end on Thursday, March 11. When this issue of Frederick Area F.Y.I. comes out, the winter sports seasons will either be completed or nearing completion. The end of one season signals the beginning of another, and unlike previous years, the thought of track and golf seasons starting isn't so hard to fathom with the current situation we have with snow cover (or lack thereof) and decent temperatures. Mother Nature still has plenty of time to throw a snow storm at us, but when they come in March or later, the snow doesn't seem to stick around long. Track practice will start on Monday, March 8, and golf will start a bit later in the month.

March also signals the end of another legislative session in Pierre. With the exception of SB 177, the current session has been quiet for the most part as far as any legislation goes that would affect K-12 education. Gov. Kristi Noem recommended a 2.4 percent increase in education funding, and I have not heard anything that would lead me to believe that the legislature won't



follow through with that. As I just mentioned, SB 177 has been a hotly contested and debated topic across the state. It has become known as the "Homeschool Bill" and is being pushed by Gov. Noem's office. Currently, districts across the state have local control when it comes to permitting home-school students to participate in extra-curricular activities. Some districts do not allow it at all, while others may require homeschool students to be enrolled in a certain number of classes per day (two class periods, half a day, etc.). This bill, if passed, would eliminate local control and require that every district allow home-school students to participate in extra-curricular activities. This bill would also eliminate any oversight of homeschool instruction by the Department of Education and

all testing requirements. There is significant academic accountability for public schools, but absolutely no accountability for homeschool instruction. Public school teachers must be certified to teach, but there is no criteria or accountability for a homeschool parent to teach. Public schools are required by law to hold students/parents accountable through truancy laws and consequences, but SB 177 would exempt all homeschool students from any school attendance.

Another concern with this bill is fairness among students who participate in activities. Students are required to keep their grades up to remain eligible to participate in different activities, but homeschool students would not have to follow the same guidelines as those students in school. The only time a homeschool student would be deemed ineligible would be if the parent reported to the school that their son/ daughter was failing a course at home. The bill was passed in the Senate and has since moved to the House.

During last year's legislative session, changes were made to the manner in which schools can generate funds for their Capital Outlay. The change set

the maximum amount districts can generate at \$3,400 per student. It affected Frederick Area greatly, as the district will lose approximately \$350,000 in annual revenue to our Capital Outlay. The district will need to consider an opt-out at some point, but whether or not that happens later this year or down the road remains to be seen. Frederick Area currently has a perpetual opt-out with the General Fund of \$150,000 per year. To make up for the funds lost in Capital Outlay, the opt-out to be considered would be in the neighborhood of \$500,000. In essence, the \$350,000 that was lost in Capital Outlay would be added to the currently existing \$150,000 opt-out and be made up on the General Fund side.

Lastly, COVID-19 cases have been all but non-existent here at Frederick Area since returning from Christmas break. We have been extremely fortunate to this point and look forward to finishing out the spring semester in what we hope will be a "normal" end to the year. Here's to thinking pleasant thoughts on a positive outcome from Pierre and continued warmer spring-like temperatures!



Many students out for track this year

Track is set to begin March 8. With the cancellation of last year's track season, we eagerly await opportunities to have our student athletes compete against themselves and some of the state's best competitors.

This season we are expecting around 40 athletes, grades 6-12. Returning coaches are head coach Marty Morlock and assistant coaches Wayne Haas and Lincoln Flakus. New to the coaching staff is assistant coach Janelle Barondeau and volunteer Dakota King.

One change for field events this year is the addition of javelin. We will be training athletes over the course of the season, throwing at facilities capable of hosting the javelin. The javelin is expected to be a state scoring event for AA schools during the 2021-22 school year. North Dakota has had javelin as a state event for some time now, so traveling north of the border to Oakes or Ellendale is a possibility.

Another change is how competitors make it to the state track meet. Instead of meeting a predetermined qualifying standard or placing first or second at regions, athletes will now have to be one of the top 24 athletes in their events to qualify.
