## Progress made on faster rural internet

By Heidi Marttila-Losure

The availability of fiber optic broadband is coming closer to reality for rural Frederick residents.

Last fall, construction was under way for the main lines bringing fiber optic cables to the property lines of people's homes and businesses. The next step is trenching in those cables up all the way up to the buildings.

Jeff Evenson, sales and marketing manager for Northern Valley Communications and James Valley Telecommunications, said a representative has been reaching out to residents and businesses over the past few weeks to get per-
mission to do this construction work, and a first contact attempt has been made for each customer. As of the end of March, nearly two-thirds had given permission. This construction has no cost for the home or business owner.

Construction will begin as soon as weather allows. Most customers should have fiber optic up to their buildings by the end of the year. Setting up a time for installation in the home or business would be the next step.

Fiber optic broadband allows for up to 1 gigabyte per second of download speed and 200 megabytes per second of upload speed. The cost varies depending on
how much capacity is desired. Prices are listed on the website: jamesvalley.com.

Customers could also get a bundled package with TV service once fiber optic broadband is installed.

Evenson noted that the area they define as "rural Frederick" also includes some homes with postal addresses of other towns, such as Westport. Also, the town of Frederick already has fiber optic broadband service through NVC/JVT, but they do not offer TV service in town.

If residents haven't yet heard from the company about getting permission for construction, they can call 605-397-2323.

# Increase in state aid is a step in the right direction

As I write this column, we are nearing the end of March. The weather has improved the last couple of weeks, the snow is gone for the most part, and thoughts of spring are a little more realistic! When this column comes out, we will only be about five weeks shy of the end of the school year.

We had a total of three school days missed due to weather this year, with one coming on our first scheduled day back from Christmas break (January 5) and the other two being back-to-back days on February 21 and 22. There is no plan to make those days up at this time.

The legislative session ended on March 10, and the biggest item affecting education was the proposal to increase the state's aid to education by 6 percent. It has been

quite a few years since the Blue Ribbon Task Force developed recommendations to increase teacher pay in our state, and the current recommended increase to state aid is much more than it has been for quite a few years. It will certainly be nice to receive and be a step in the right direction, but in addition to certified staff, we will also see increases in auxiliary staff costs, utility expenses, fuel, and everything else that goes into running a school district. Hopefully
increases like this can become more common for education and not be something that only happens every half a dozen years or so.

Before we completely put a wrap on the winter sports season, I'd like to recognize a few of our student-athletes for the basketball post-season honors they received. On the girls' side, Laura Sumption was named to the First Team AllLRC, and Sofi Losure was Honorable Mention. For the boys, Ethan Morlock was a Second Team AllLRC selection and Mason Hinz was Honorable Mention.

Now on to Track and Golf! Coach Marty Morlock once again leads the track program and has a significant increase in numbers compared to more recent years. He has a total of 50 kids in the program (grades 6 through 12). There are 15 boys and 10 girls in the high school, and the same
exact break down exists in junior high. Assisting him this year are Wayne Haas, Janelle Barondeau, and Megan Russo. The first track meet we attended was on Tuesday, March 22. Golf will have officially gotten its start on Monday, March 28, and there will be six participants this fall - three boys and three girls, all in high school. It will more than likely be a little while before we are able to attend any golf meets, though.

Other activities that will be coming as we near the end of the school year include the State FCCLA Convention on April 11 and 12; NSU Math Contest on April 20; K-12 Spring Concert on Thursday, May 5, at 7 p.m.; Awards Night on Wednesday, May 11, at 7 p.m.; and Commencement on Saturday, May 14, at 1 p.m. The last day of school for Frederick Area students will be Wednesday, May 18, with a regular dismissal time of 3:40.
