# Board opposes school voucher proposal

In a roll call vote during their December meeting, the Frederick Area School Board voted unanimously to adopt a resolution in opposition to the school voucher proposal that Gov. Kristi Noem put forward in her annual budget address on December 2.

Noem proposed putting \$4 million into an Education Savings Accounts program, more commonly known as school vouchers. The funds would go toward student fees at private schools or other forms of alternative education, up to \$3,000 per student annually.

Board member Eric Sumption put forward the resolution.

"(The school voucher program proponents') idea is that the parents have the right to educate their kids. And I totally get that, if you want to be able to choose what way you want to do it, but (this proposal) I think is going to kill our public school system," Sumption said.

He thinks Frederick Area would end up with fewer students.

"I don't know how we wouldn't lose kids, because we have a lot of kids coming out of Aberdeen to come here because they want a small-school setting," he said. The proposal would annually give those families \$3,000 per student



# Governor proposes small increase for education

When this column comes out, the first semester of the school year will be complete, with staff and students finishing up on Friday, December 20. I am not sure where the time went, but at least for me, this past fall went by unbelievably fast! School will resume with the start of the second semester on Monday, January 6.

Gov. Kristi Noem gave her annual budget address recently, and she is recommending an increase of 1.5% for education. Reflected revenue collections are more than \$24 million behind projections, so things are going to tighten up some this year. This is quite a bit less than the previous three years that saw recommendations of 4%, 5%, and 6%. We will have to wait and see where things end up at the end of the upcoming legislative session.



In that address, she proposed an Education Savings Account, which is simply a different term for a school voucher program. It will be introduced this upcoming session as well. The proposed program will start by using \$4 million in public taxpayer dollars to implement the school voucher program. It is thought that it won't stop at that figure, as the Governor stated that the goal was to expand the program before

it has even been adopted. Any growth would inevitably take away millions of dollars from our state's public schools. This will no doubt be one of the more hotly debated and contested topics during the upcoming session.

Boys and girls basketball seasons have begun across the state. The girls began on Monday, November 25, and the boys on Monday, December 2. Brock Pashen, Alex Sumption and Don Nickelson are coaching the boys, while myself, Sarah Sumption and Troy Podoll are coaching the girls. A total of 21 boys are participating, with eighteen from Frederick and three from Leola. A total of 15 girls are participating, with ten from Frederick and five from Leola. Mother Nature hasn't thrown any curveballs at us vet, but it is early and she still has time.

The Frederick Area athletes in

grades nine through twelve who participated in football, volleyball, and cross country this past fall; have all qualified their respective activities/teams for the "Academic Achievement Team Award." To qualify, the collective average GPAs for all student-athletes involved in the varsity sport must be at or above 3.0. The football team, volleyball team, and boys cross-country teams were all well above that mark, with the lowest average being 3.38. Our student athletes are doing well academically!

We look forward to resuming school and the activities that come with it, and here's to hoping for a wonderful spring semester!



that could be put toward tuition at Aberdeen Christian, a small school without the commute for those families.

The funds could also support homeschool programs, which benefits families with the time and resources to have a parent dedicated to teaching. If homeschool isn't an option, then the proposal only increases choice for students with both a public and private school within a reasonable commuting distance. For many rural students, there would be no additional school nearby to choose.

Frederick Area board members are not the only public school representatives opposing the proposal. The South Dakota Education Association issued a statement saying the program would divert taxpayer funds to private schools, which do not have to follow anti-discrimination laws.

This means that public schools may end up with the students that require more resources and services, because private schools are not obligated to serve them, while some students that require fewer resources will choose to attend private schools, taking their state funding allocation out of public schools. The average cost of educating a student in public school would increase in this scenario.

"I don't not want to educate a kid with spe-

cial needs (at Frederick Area). I'm all for it. We do what we can. Because I want to educate everybody," Sumption said. "But I just don't know how this is adding more choice."

The text of Frederick Area's resolution follows.

#### Opposition to School Voucher

WHEREAS South Dakota public schools are a cornerstone of the state and the pride of their communities, welcoming all children, educating and feeding them, connecting them with friends and mentors and helping shape their future while preparing them to be the next generation of our state's workforce;

WHEREAS the proposed Education Savings Account (ESA) – for the 2025 legislative session – is simply a different title for a school voucher program;

WHEREAS research indicates school voucher programs consistently fail to improve academic outcomes;

WHEREAS the proposed program will be implemented by using millions in public taxpayer dollars to fund non-public schools that may pick and choose who they admit while also charging tuition and raising millions of dollars in scholarship funds or to fund homeschool programs with no transparency or accountability measures to prove success similar to those required of public schools;

WHEREAS the state budget, which provides the funding increase for public education, faces constraints due to stagnant revenue collections and as a result, the proposed increase in state aid for public schools is less than the level of inflation:

WHEREAS with lower than expected revenue collections creating a lean state budget the introduction of a new, ongoing funding system for a school voucher program will eventually lead to an unbalanced state budget or a decrease in funding for public education;

WHEREAS the school voucher program will not stop at the initial amount, as the intention to grow school voucher funding has already been stated even before it has been adopted;

WHEREAS the school voucher program's planned and inevitable growth will be damaging to the future of our public school system, students and communities;

WHEREAS we, as School Board members, insist our legislators oppose the proposed school voucher program because of the foreseeable detrimental impact it will have on South Dakota's public school system at the expense of our students;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, we, the Frederick Area School Board, oppose the proposed school voucher program for the 2025 legislative session.

# Local projects receive \$10,000

With a few days left in 2024, the North Brown Community Foundation has tied its greatest number of donations received in a year with 33. (The other highdonation-count year was 2020, when we were in the midst of our matching funds campaign.)

Many of the 2024 donations were in memory of beloved community members who died in the past year. We are grateful for the way in which those people chose to invest in our community while they were here, and we are also thankful that those who loved them have chosen to continue that legacy with donations to the foundation.

These many donations also totaled to a good amount for 2024: \$3,115 as of Dec. 23.

These donations, and all of the other donations that have gone into the fund since its inception in 2014, add to the fund's principal balance, from which the grant amount is calculated. Each year, 4.5 percent (calculated from a four-year rolling average) is available to the board of the foundation to distribute to community needs. As of Dec. 23, the balance of the principal is \$233,597.29. This is a significant figure for a community with a small population and shows gratitude for the community's past, love for the community at present, and a belief in the community's future.

The NBCF achieved an important milestone in 2024: It awarded \$10,000 in grants to community projects. NBCF board members had been looking forward to this milestone since the principal balance jumped over \$225,000, but we had to wait for the four-rolling average to catch up before we had those funds available. In 2024, we got there. From here on, we will have at least \$10,000 to award every year, as far into the future as you can imagine. This amount can really make a difference in the projects that people care about in our community.

The NBCF awarded the following grants in 2024:

- \$3.000 to the Frederick Athletic Association (via the Town of Frederick) for improvements to the baseball field
- \$5,000 to the Frederick Area Volunteer Firefighters in support of the asphalt project at the new
- \$2,000 to the Frederick Area Historical Society for installation of a heater in the archive room of the museum

The grant application period for 2025 is now open. Projects should benefit people in the geographic area of the Frederick Area School District, including the communities of Barnard, Elm Lake, Frederick, and Westport.

WHEREAS the proposed Education Savings Account (ESA) - for the 2025 legislative session - is simply a different title for a school voucher program;

WHEREAS the proposed program will be implemented by using millions in public taxpayer dollars to fund non-public schools that may pick and choose who they admit while also charging tuition and raising millions of dollars in scholarship funds or to fund homeschool programs with no transparency or accountability measures to prove success similar to those required of public schools;

WHEREAS the state budget, which provides the funding increase for public education, faces constraints due to stagnant revenue collections and as a result, the proposed increase in state aid for public schools is less than the level of inflation; WHEREAS with lower than expected revenue

collections creating a lean state budget the introduction of a new, ongoing funding system for a school voucher program will eventually lead to an unbalanced state budget or a decrease in funding for public education;

WHEREAS the school voucher program will not stop at the initial amount, as the intention to grow school voucher funding has already been stated even before it has been adopted;

WHEREAS the school voucher program's planned and inevitable growth will be damaging to the future of our public school system, students and communities;

WHEREAS we, as School Board members, insist our legislators oppose the proposed school voucher program because of the foreseeable detrimental impact it will have on South Dakota's public school system at the expense of our students;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, we, the Frederick Area School Board, oppose the proposed school voucher program for the 2025 legislative session.

The following week we faced highly ranked Faulkton Area in Leola and had a great second half to pull away with a 42-20 victory to start the season 5-0. We had our bye week after that and then were not able to play the Northwestern game due to them not having enough players, so we received a forfeit win. We finished the regular season with two road games at Ipswich and Warner. We went three weeks between games following the bye and forfeit, and we struggled to gain the offensive traction we had earlier in the season, dropping a hardfought overtime game to Ipswich 14-12 and then losing the finale at Warner to finish the regular season with a 6-2 record.

We opened the post-season with a home game in Frederick against the Kimball-White Lake Kiotes, and like the previous season, we were the 8 seed hosting the 9 seed. We struggled for much of the game, but the defense played extremely well in the second half and an 84-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter gave us the spark we needed and we were able to tie the game up and eventually win in overtime. After scoring on our possession in

the extra frame, Westyn Thorpe picked off a pass on third down to seal the victory.

The second-round matchup saw us travel to the top-seeded Parkston Trojans. We were going toe to toe with them for most of the first half and then the injury bug bit, with Noah Kippley breaking his collarbone to start a fairly long list of kids exiting the contest. The season ended that night with the Titans finishing 7-3 on the season.

Statistically speaking, we were better in nearly every area. We averaged 6.15 yards per carry (5.39 last year), 15.49 yards per reception (16.8 last year), and we completed 60% of our pass attempts (48% last year). Defensively we gave up an average of 17.2 points per game this year (22.3 last year).

Five players earned all-conference honors, including seniors Gavin Nickelson, Dustin Wurtz, and Noah Kippley; and juniors Ethan Petrich and Westyn Thorpe. Nickelson and Thorpe were also selected to the 9AA All-State team at defensive back and linebacker respectively, with Petrich receiving honorable mention status.

Individual awards, voted on by the players, included: Most Valuable Offense – Gavin Nickelson, Most Valuable Defense – Westyn Thorpe, Most Valuable Lineman – Dustin Wurtz, Most Improved – Jace Thorpe, and Hardest Worker – Noah Kippley.

We will say farewell to four seniors off this past year's squad and will return six start-
